Message from the Principal

Message from the Chaplain What is togetherness?

Togetherness is experienced on many levels. In one sense we are all part of one human race in another we are together in families or together as a nation. The human bond of relationship is one of the main points of life. We are happiest when we have someone to share that happiness with. Sometimes we think we'd like to be alone all the time but remember 'no man is an island'. Countries, families and schools thrive when we see the value of what we have in common. If we see all that we have in common with each other, if we acknowledge our differences but can still come together then we are doing one of the most important things any person can do. It will transform our lives and every community we are part of! Our school is a wonderful opportunity to live out in practice this fantastic vision of togetherness. Especially in these times where we have been challenged physically and emotionally and been separated for so long we need to rally around what

Where does togetherness come from?

The fact is that we all look to different ideas to unite us. Many unite around interests, beliefs and activities. I believe the best unity we can find starts with God.

Christians believe God created one human race, made in God's image with equal value in God's eyes. But he also made us all unique and individuals. I'm happy about that!

Christian Togetherness

Jesus wanted to make a community where his people could be together. Jesus called this his 'church'. This is supposed to be a place where believers in Jesus come together and serve one another. It is a place where there are different roles for everyone, different gifts and different backgrounds even different authority and responsibility but where everyone is of equal value with equal rights. The togetherness the church has is based on Jesus sending his Spirit. When Christians live by following God's spirit we see a beautiful togetherness that breaks all boundaries. When Christians don't allow God's Spirit to guide them there is no togetherness!

There have been some incredible times of God showing what 'togetherness looks like' When the church was born at Pentecost thousands of people saw the disciples speaking about the wonderful works of God miraculously in their own language. Sadly the Roman empire slavery was everywhere and it didn't go away. Christians were taught that every human was of equal value and this didn't match up with the slavery going on. The church was so different to society that people who were slaves in society were actually leaders in the church and slave masters were under the leadership of their slaves!. This powerful conformation of the value of each human life would eventually lead to slavery being abolished in the West as Christianity turned the world upside down.

Togetherness with God

There is an even greater togetherness that Jesus came to bring. Not only to unite people with each other and break down the walls between humans but also to breakdown the separation between God and man. When Jesus died the huge curtain separating the holiest place in the temple tore from the top to the bottom because God had ripped down the separating walls to Himself. This was one of the many symbols which speak of Jesus death and
