Rationale

Careers education and guidance programmes play a major part in helping young people choose a career pathway that suits their individual interests, needs and abilities and helps to raise aspirations in the community we serve.

Statutory requirements

Our programme of careers activities has been developed in line with the eight Gatsby benchmarks and to meet the Department for Education's statutory guidance 2018.

Aims

To help students to develop the knowledge, skills and confidence to make informed decisions about their futures and to manage the transitions from one stage of their education, training or work to the next.

Objectives

- To make students aware of the range of opportunities which are available to them in continued education and training at 14+, 16+ and 18+.
- To equip students with the knowledge they need to make informed decisions at transition points.
- To give students an awareness of the variety of education, training and careers opportunities locally and nationally.
- To foster links between the school, local business and further / higher education establishments.
- To enable students to experience the world of work.
- To ensure that wherever possible all young people leave the school to enter employment, further education or training.
- To create a culture of high aspiration
- To promote equality of opportunity, celebrate diversity, challenge stereotypes and ensure that any students requiring extra support receive it.

Work experience

The objective of the work experience programme is to enable students to experience the world of work first-hand. Where possible students should seek a placement in an environment which is linked to a career which they are considering for their own future. All students will be offered the opportunity to undertake a one-week placement in the summer term of year 10. Where physical face-to-face work experiences are restricted, for example by Covid, replacement virtual events will be offered. It is ultimately the student's responsibility to ensure they have secured a placement before the deadline. However, support will be given to students through this process in assemblies, template letters and phone calls as well as assistance as needed from the work experience lead staff. Prior to the placement, students will participate in preparation activities such as mock

interviews, CV and letter writing. Students will be briefed on expectations prior to their placement. Students will be visited during their placement by a member of staff.

All work experience placements are checked by Safety Measures to ensure we meet our safeguarding requirements.
