Message from the Chaplain:

Without equality there can be no justice. It is the equality of each human that demands justice and it is our longing for justice that drives us to stand up and stand out to achieve it. The Christian faith teaches that every human has been made in the image of God (Genesis 1:27). This is one of the strongest religious motivations for justice and equality. When God sent His son Jesus

Discussion points:

- What is our motivation to stand up for justice and equality?

- Why would God allow Jesus to be born to a poor family and laid in a manger, not even born in his own house?

we see that he was poor and eventually suffered great injustice and was killed for claims about his identity, claiming to be the son of God. Most people would expect the son of God to be born in a palace not placed in a manger. But Jesus identified with everyday people, he took time to know his community, his disciples. He had real friends (and enemies) and cared about individuals, equally. Jesus never travelled beyond his own country, never held political office never owned a business or property yet His teaching, His life, His death have impacted the world for good promoting justice. Jesus claimed he came to 'give his life a ransom for many' The core message of the Christian faith is that God knows our failures and our hardships and came to live among us offering us a relationship with him by being forgiven through Jesus' sacrifice.

- Reflect on the Christian belief that God knows each of our situations and offers hope.
- What difference does it make to our communities when we stand together to help?
- Jesus was poor but he changed the world, how did he do this?
- How can we change our communities through our attitude and our effort even without power or finances?
